STRENGTHENED REGIONAL AND **INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION** MECHANISM TO CURB DRUG SUPPLY IN WIO

EU is an important and long-standing partner contributing to maritime security (including drug-trafficking) in the WIO

- Improving the regional maritime capability (MASE Regional Agreements and support to the Regional Maritime Security Architecture
- Partnership between EUNAVFOR ATLANTA and 2 Regional maritime Centres (RMIFC/RCOC)
- Capacity building and provision of maritime domain awareness solutions and information sharing tools
- Support to National Coast Guards to undertake regionally coordinated operations at sea

Regional Policy on Port Security and Safety of Navigation

Working with international and regional partners (UNODC, IMO, INTERPOL and IOC)

- Review of port security legislations to ensure compliance with international norms
- Port facilities security measures and risk assessment are enhanced on Port State Control inspections
- Security Enforcement in Port (Harbour Security and Narcotics) Checkpoints)
- Port Control Unit multi agency approach for cargo targeting to track illicit trade/drug trafficking.
- Regional mechanism to track suspicious cargo/persons



Tracking and disrupting drug supply networks with appropriate legal finish

Safe Seas Africa Programme – WIO region

- Consolidating the Regional Maritime Security Architecture (RMSA)
- Support regional legal base against cross-border maritime crimes including drug trafficking
- EU concluded exchange agreement with Seychelles for trial and prosecution of drug trafficking
- Capacity building of law enforcement agencies for trial and prosecution - policing, investigation and judiciary Coordination between the RMSA and Djibouti Code of Conduct (DCoC) to improve maritime zones of interest



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EU ACT 2



- EU Global Programme fighting organized crime in general, and drug trafficking, in particular, along the so-called heroin routes from/to Afghanistan with a particular focus in East and South Africa
- Implemented by a Consortium of EU Member States led by Spain in collaboration with France and Italy
- The programme has 3 components

Enhanced capacity of **law** enforcement authorities to exchange information and conduct joint operations and investigations

Enhanced capacity of the judiciary to prosecute and adjudicate OC cases

Improved evidencebase, knowledge and analysis of the threats





EU ACT 2



- EU ACT will work with partner countries to reduce drug trafficking facilitatating regional and transregional cooperation notably in the following areas
 - ✓ Synthetic Drugs and precursors
 - ✓ Darknet markets and online trade
 - Money laundering investigations linked to drug trafficking
 - Cross border investigations
 - Information sharing and interagency coordination
 - Joint cross border investigations (law enforcement + prosecution)
 - Mutual legal assistance and judicial cooperation.
 - Compliance with human rights drug related legislation and procedure
 - Increased participation of women addressing organized crime and drug trafficking





EU ACT 2



- EU ACT 2 can also explore provision of support for **Regional Observatories** based in other experiences and notably
 - Strategic support for strengthening national systems and regional networks for scientific research on drugs.
 - Improvement of the analysis and incidence capacity of the National Observatories on Drugs.
 - Incorporation of the differential and rights approach in the information and investigation systems of the NDOs.
 - Development and strengthening of drug policy monitoring and evaluation systems.
 - Development and strengthening of national Early Warning Systems.
 - Technical support for developing fundamental aspects of the National Drug Observatories (NDOs).
